

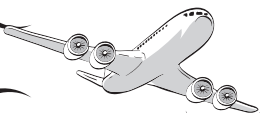
CHARLIE & JEANNIE

Instructional Aid and Guided Questions

1. Where do Charlie and Jeannie's parents tell them they are going?
On an airplane trip
2. Have Charlie and Jeannie been on a plane before?
No
3. Why are Charlie and Jeannie nervous?
Because they've never been on a plane before and they don't know what to expect
4. What do Charlie and Jeannie pack to take on the plane?
Books and an iPad for movies
5. Why do they go through security?
To make sure everyone is safe
6. Who do Charlie and Jeannie see in the cockpit?
The pilot and co-pilot
7. What do Charlie and Jeannie see in the cockpit?
Buttons and chairs
8. What do the pilot and co-pilot tell Charlie and Jeannie?
That the plane is very safe
9. What do Charlie and Jeannie see out the window after the plane takes off?
Clouds
10. Why are Charlie and Jeannie proud?
Because they overcame their fear of flying



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Key Messages:

1. Plane rides are fun and exciting.
2. It's okay to ask questions if you are nervous.
3. Celebrate and be proud if you overcome your fears.
4. Fears can be overcome.
5. Trying new things can be exciting, even if they're scary at first.

Activities and Discussion:

1. Draw, color or trace a plane.
2. Talk about your first plane ride.
3. Share a story about something you find scary.
4. Talk about what to do if you're nervous.
5. Talk about being proud and when you've felt proud.
6. Ask the Early Readers if they've ever been on an airplane and how it felt.

Tips:

1. Point to the characters as you read.
2. Discuss the story and Charlie and Jeannie's feelings as you go.
3. Talk about overcoming fears and give personal examples.
4. Ask the Early Readers to share a fear they've overcome.
5. Ask the Early Readers who their favorite character is and why.
